Marie Claude Boucher's bold, crooked houses have been a bestseller this year at the gallery and the work of Norman Boisvert has all but sold out. Ken Kirsch is a popular realist painter who specializes in cottage scenery and also does commissions of family cottages and homes in the Muskoka area.

The work of all 26 artists featured at the gallery, including well-known masters Stanley Cosgrove, Serge Brunoni, and Gaston Rebry, can be viewed on the gal-
